HISTORY POLICY

History is the study of the human past and the methods that we use to find out and communicate it. History at Sutton CE (VC) Primary School should equip children to think critically e.g. learning independently, understanding cause and consequence.

Aims

The aims for history reflect the key elements of the attainment targets and can be summarised as:

- 1. Chronological Understanding to develop a sense of time, placing events, people and changes within a chronological framework, using appropriate term
- 2. Knowledge and Understanding of events, people and changes in the past -
 - to gain knowledge of the characteristics of people living in particular periods, including their attitudes and beliefs and their social, cultural, religious and ethnic diversity.
 - b) to describe and analyse reasons for and results of events, situations and changes studied, making links across and between periods.
- 3. Historical Interpretation to identify ways in which the past is represented.
- 4. Historical Enquiry
 - a) to develop analytical skills by asking the children to examine, compare and interpret different sources of information.
 - b) to learn how to ask and answer historical questions.
 - to develop communicative abilities as children select and organise historical information and communicate this knowledge in a variety of ways with appropriate vocabulary.
- 5. Organisation and Communication To develop curriculum creative abilities as children select and organise historical information and communicate this knowledge in a variety of ways with appropriate vocabulary.

Learning Objectives

Pupils will be given opportunities to develop an awareness of the past and of the ways in which it differs from the present. Studies at Key Stage 1 will be set within a chronological framework which will enable them to understand some of the ways in which we find out about the past. At Key Stage 2 the children will be taught about important episodes and developments in Britain's past from Romans to modern times, about Ancient Civilisations and the history of other parts of the world. They will be helped to develop a chronological framework by making links across the National Curriculum's programmes of study. Pupils will have opportunities to investigate their local history and to learn about the past through a range of information sources.

Curriculum Organisation

History is taught as part of our teaching themes. The children are taught in mixed ability groups by the class teacher. History is also taught through Literacy work. Within both Key Stages role play may be used to encourage greater empathy with events from the past.

Time Allocation

Sutton CE (VC) Primary School has allocated the following time to history per year

KS1 36 hours per yearKS2 45 hours per year

Teaching and Learning Strategies

At Sutton CE (VC) Primary School we endeavour to differentiate according to the child's stage of learning development.

Teaching and learning strategies include whole class discussion, differentiated group work, educational visits, use of secondary sources of information and artefacts, visits by theatre groups and volunteers from the local community.

History is linked to aspects of Science, Art, Literacy, Music, Design and Technology, Geography and Religious Education.
