## Home learning themes

We understand that working on different topics with different aged children can be challenging, when trying to educate children at home. We have therefore reviewed and revised our approaches to home learning, with this in mind. Home learning will now follow a school theme for a two week period. Our first theme is 'Animals' and this will be followed by 'Magical Worlds'. Our home learning leads will be planning activities around these themes for your children to try and make things more manageable. <u>Please be aware that staff at the school will only be actively responding to children's learning on class</u> <u>dojo between their normal contact hours with children, which is between 9 am and 4pm. Although some staff may choose to respond outside of these times, we hope that by setting this expectation that you don't feel disappointed if a member of staff <u>is unable to contact you until the next day.</u></u>



#### Department for Education support for Home Learning

The Department for Education recognise that many settings are sharing resources for children who are at home and have expressed their gratitude for this. They have now supplied <u>a list of online educational resources</u> which have been identified by some of the country's leading educational experts to support learning at home. The DfE also wants to support parents and all early years and childcare settings to ensure children's early learning can continue. Available support includes:

The Department for Education's <u>Hungry Little Minds</u> campaign features tips and practical activities that parents can do at home with children to support their early learning. There are many simple ways to help children learn and it does not have to feel like 'learning'. #### **Ely Cathedral Learning activities**

I hope that you are all safe and well during these testing times. As you will be aware, Ely Cathedral has had to shut its doors for only the 2nd time in its 900 year history. As such, we are not currently able to welcome you and your students into the Cathedral as we would like. However, so that we can stay in touch and continue to support you and your students we have put together a range of different resources that we hope will be of use to you in the coming weeks.

We have created a FaceBook group - Ely Cathedral Learning Fun for Families - through which we are sharing the following resources:

Mondays @ 10.30am - Bible Stories for children aged 2-6 with suggested craft activities. This is closely linked to our sessions around the stained glass windows in the Cathedral and the stories they tell.

**Wednesdays** @ **10.30am** - The History of Ely Cathedral. This is a series of 10-20 minute videos which cover the history of the Cathedral in chronological order. This would be particularly useful for those schools who would wish their students to work on their local history projects over the course of the next half term. It is closely linked to our sessions round Etheldreda, Hereward and Monastic Life and is aimed at children aged 7-12.

**Fridays** @ 10.30am - "The Wickit Chronicles". Each week we will read a new chapter of "The Wickit Chronicles - Ely Plot". This is a book about a young orphan boy who is brought up in a monastery on the Fens during the middle ages. After each chapter there will be suggested activities for the children to have a go at that will help them to learn more about the history of the Fens as well as medieval monastic life. We are really lucky that the author, Joan Lennon, has also joined out group and will be on hand to answer any questions that the children might have about the story and the characters. These stories are aimed at children aged 7-11.

We understand that some parents will not have a FaceBook account. As such, links to all of these resources can be found on the Ely Cathedral Website, in the learning tab.

In addition to our FaceBook offer, we have also created **a set of curriculum resources for Religious Education** that children can use for their homelearning. Each lesson includes a video with clear instructions as well as printable activity sheets for children to complete as they progress through the video. There is one series aimed at **KS1 which looks at Festivals** and another aimed at **KS2 which looks at the teachings of Jesus**. They are all free, the first lesson for each key stage will be available from tomorrow and the other sessions will all be available for donwload by the end of next week.

I do hope that you will find these resources useful and very much look forward to seeing you and your students in the Cathedral very soon.
