In Key Stages 1 and 2, homework is provided in a half termly menu with a spectrum of activities that cover a range of curriculum areas. Parents are provided with this at the start of each half term and there is an expectation that at least one piece of work is completed per week. This is alongside, times tables, spelling/phonics.

Homework books will go home on a THURSDAY and should be returned to school on a MONDAY each week, giving your child enough time to practise their spellings and enabling us to quarantine their books before they are sent out again.

It is expected that each week children will learn their list of spellings tested on the following Monday. You will be given a variety of ways to practise the spellings in the front of your book as well as the look, write, cover check method.

It is a national expectation that all children will know times tables to 12x12 by the end of Year 4. These will also be tested in school to ensure they are known. We are part of the programme Timestable Rockstars and this will help your child to recall the multiplication and division facts at speed. Please encourage your child to practise them regularly by using the website or App. <u>www.timestablerockstars.co.uk</u> They will soon have a password stuck in their book.
