Teaching and learning:

Fen Detectives:

Year 3/4 have been engineers, inspired by local scientists. This term they have created their own wind turbines and visited Ely museum and Prickwillow. They have also had great fun building dams, linked to their Fen Detectives topic. Engineers explained about their work repairing the Ouse Valley Drainage network on behalf of the Environment Agency. Many of you will have seen their work on the banks between Sutton and Earith over the summer. The children had the chance to experiment with sand, gravel and clay to make a small scale working dam, to gain an understanding of how water can be contained.

DNA:

The Year 5/6 team were fortunate to have a professional scientist come in with Dr. Hamlyn. The children were able to showcase their knowledge on their recent Evolution Science topic and they were given the opportunity to extract some DNA from a strawberry. The children had a fantastic time and it was absolutely great that Dr. Hamlyn gave up her time to come in and work with the children.

Ruby & Sapphire classes:

Following a successful recruitment process I am delighted to share that we have been able to recruit a full time teacher for Ruby class until we are able to recruit a permanent member of staff – until the end of the academic year if necessary. There will be opportunities for the children to get to know their new teacher, Mrs Kilgour – she will be teaching in the class and handing over with Mrs Dilley on Friday 14th December

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and after school there is an opportunity for parents to come in and meet with her and introduce yourselves – I am sure everyone will be making her very welcome.

Mrs Korniotis and Mrs Laskar have switched the ends of the week they teach so as of this week, Mrs Laskar is teaching Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday morning & Mrs Korniotis is teaching Wednesday afternoon, Thursday & Friday.

Governor Maths monitoring in KS1:

Governors were really pleased to see how Maths working walls are being used in KS1 to scaffold learning and some fantastic hand on independent challenges where Reception and Year 1 pupils were challenged to apply their knowledge and solve tricky problems, having to reason and explain their solutions. They were pleased to see how work to further increase the level of challenge is going well and all pupils were actively engaged, discussing their challenges with a good use of the technical vocabulary. They also noted how well Year 2 staff are working together as a team to deliver the curriculum in this important year group.

Pastoral work of the school

At Sutton school we take our pastoral work very seriously – this is why we have invested in establishing a strong leadership team who are therefore more available to meet with you to discuss any concerns you may have – one of us is available on the playground & the slt@sutton.cambs.sch.uk email address should be up and running very soon – using this ensures that key leaders are in the loop and follow action can be monitored.

As part of our ongoing safety work in school, classes will be running the NSPCC PANTS campaign. In classes staff are having initial conversations with the children over the coming weeks and after the Christmas break we will have a whole school focus on it. ANTI-BULLYING WEEK

Following the success of anti-bullying week, where we worked with materials from the Anti-Bullying Alliance (ABA) we have launched our #respect wall. One thing we really focused on was the introduction of a 'Peace Path' to help children take responsibility and make amends where they are due and encouraging the value of forgiveness. All classes engaged with this work throughout the week and we have been pleased to see that pupils are increasingly speaking up where they feel there is a problem so that we can act proactively and robustly.

Obviously this work doesn't take place in one week – it is, as ever, an ongoing process and we are now looking at our Anti-bullying policy, alongside our Behaviour policy which we are developing with the school council, staff and governors. Please remember that if you have **any concerns** regarding bullying or any other behaviour, we urge you to talk to your child's class teacher in the first instance so that we can take decisive action. Age appropriate films and games:

It has come to our attention that large numbers of pupils are talking about films they have watched and games they have played (either with older siblings or alone) that are not age appropriate. As Designated Safeguarding Lead for the school I must make parents aware that as a school we have an important role to play in working with you to support every child's emotional and mental wellbeing. Supporting and challenging parents to understand the safeguarding implications and the significant impact that these

materials can have on a developing child is part of that – particularly as children often talk about it amongst themselves which in turn has a negative impact on others.

In the new year we will be running a series of internet safety inititaives in school, including information workshops for parents.

If you have any concerns about material that your own child or another child may be accessing please do let us know so that we can do all we can to support children and their families.

Church ethos

As a church school we are reflecting on our school vision and Christian values and what they mean to us.
