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
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Recommended reads

Pen licence

This week teacher's have started to award Pen Licence points, so well done to the children who have achieved this. To get a pen licence point:

All letters must be formed correctly in the correct orientation.

All writing must be on the line.

All handwriting must be the correct, consistent size and not too big or too small.

All handwriting must be joined up and cursive where appropriate.

All writing must be to the best of that specific child's ability.

To be awarded a Pen Licence, the child MUST be awarded ten 'PL' points in their writing. This has to be from a range of work across the curriculum. We understand as a school that some children struggle with handwriting and fine motor skills. Therefore the judgement will be taken using the teacher's knowledge of that child and the effort and improvement they have seen will be taken into consideration when awarding the Pen Licence.

PE kits and jewellery

- -Shorts (plain blue)

- -plimsolls or trainers
- -A track-suit for winter occasions may be advisable.

Please remember to label/name all clothes with your child's name. Jewellery may not be worn in school. The only exceptions are watches, studs for pierced ears and cultural or religious adornments, which must be removed during lessons involved physical exercise (including swimming). If such items cannot be removed, the individual is not prepared in an acceptably safe way and cannot continue as is, so must take part in modified activity. The school will not accept responsibility for removing or storing studs. Long hair should be tied back.
