EDUCATION CENTRE EMBRACES NEW Technology in response to covid 19

Since the lockdown back in March the Waste Education Team at Amey Waterbeach, have been busy developing a host of online resources with the aim of engaging school children and their families in the importance of recycling and encouraging them to recycle and re-use as much of their house hold waste as possible.

Waste Education Manager Jon Crisp has been busy working closely with Amey's communication team in developing an education hub, that allows children and their families to access a range of free downloadable educational resources and activities.

The activities on offer have all been designed so they can be easily completed at home without the need for any specialist tools, and materials required can be readily found around the home.

"The aim is to make learning about recycling at home fun as well as educate, engage and inspire our young people, to learn more about caring for their environment." Jon explained.

The hub was launched with a "build a birdfeeder competition". Children were encouraged to build a birdfeeder from a plastic bottle and post their efforts on Amey's community wall. "The response has been amazing" commented jon with dozens of entries. The hub can be found at www.amey.co.uk/education/

Soon to be added to the hub is an **interactive recycling** quiz along with a suite of information and activity sheets. Building a battery from copper coins, and an electromagnet made out of a nall and copper wire are just some of activities which aim to engage children in learning about science and how it is used to process our waste.
