

## **PUPIL ATTENDANCE** INFORMATION



Pupil attendance continues to improve across the school with all classes with statutory school aged children having attendance levels inline with or above national averages.

Reception pupil data is skewed by the transition sessions at the beginning of the academic year, but overall attendance is also pleasing.

As the orange line indicates, there remains a significant issue of punctuality amongst a small group of families. With 7% of pupils having been registered late at least once this half term, could I politely remind parents of the importance of being in school on time, before the register closes.

Parents can be fined for persistent lateness as this too is classified as an unauthorised absence.
